# July Meeting Summary

#### Adam Freihoefer

Adam Freihoefer's talk focused on the current state of Arizona groundwater modeling, including the newest model set to be released this year, and outlined how ADWR plans to change how it manages and produces data in the future. By bringing the audience through the steps currently involved in the creation of a model, he gave the audience a better understanding of the model's strengths and potential weaknesses. The audience also got a glimpse of some preliminary trends and of how much more data the new model will be working with. The data going into the model have been broken down into more precise fields, and the model output precision has been increased from square miles to square quarter-miles for better resolution of trends. New geological data have been incorporated into the model, as well. According to Adam, ADWR plans to release updates to the models on a more regular basis, giving workers in the field a more accurate and timely guide from which to work from. The new model has been much-anticipated and will provide an important tool for making decisions about the protection and use of Arizona's most precious resource.
